

WORKING GROUPS: RECENT DEVELOPMENTS Gerhart Rott, Vice-president

EDORA's strengths have always been the voluntary contributions of its members and the competence of the coordinating bodies in integrating a diversity of interests and expectations into meaningful steps, in order to build up an effective professional organization and a supporting European network.

Four corner-stones can describe the framework to which those activities are related:

- the focus on the perspective of the students and their educational and personal development in higher education
- the changes within the institutions of higher education and the world of knowledge as well as the world of career development and employment
- · the professional foundation of counselling and guidance approaches within higher education
- European integration, including the building up of relations to those organizations and programmes which promote and influence its impact on higher education (like the Directorate-General for Education and Culture of the European Commission and its Leonardo or Socrates Programme)

EDORA members have always felt it was worthwhile to put considerable effort into building up a network. Quite a number of those concerned with the development of the European dimension felt it was useful to support this engagement. As David Coyne, the Director for Education within the Directorate-General for Education and Culture of the European Commission put it in a talk with the EC-Board last year: If Fedora did not exist, one would have to invent it.

We have fulfilled our tasks and objectives through professionalism and high competence in cross-cultural communications. There have been difficulties and setbacks, but basically we have encountered a friendly, cooperative climate with a lot of goodwill, and this has encouraged self-organization and participation on the basis of voluntary work and commitment. We have achieved coordinated action in quite complex fields of activity. The success of the congresses, conferences, summer universities, publications and projects has been possible because we communicated within our diversity and enhanced our common ground.

Within this process the working groups have played an important role producing continuity and providing input. Topics related to daily work have encouraged us to ex-change ideas and perspectives. Members could find reciprocity of interest and could share subtle professional values, which helped to support coordinate actions and maintain commitments. Challenging tasks have been tackled. Continuity, long-term commitment and experience played an important role here.

In the past EC, a debate about the structure of the working groups started. Basically questions of legitimacy, transparency and membership were on the agenda as well as internal structure and coordination. One starting point was complaints to the EC by new members that they felt excluded and saw no chance to participate.

Papers were produced and suggestions made to solve this problem. One focus was the question how new members could be integrated into the structure of the working groups, how and to what extent they were invited to participate. Others were concerned with limiting the time of membership and with the coordinating role of the EC.

As well as papers, the past EC also produced a questionnaire about fields of interest. This was distributed to members and provided initial feedback about their wishes and expectations.

My task as vice-president includes coordinating the working groups within the overall framework of FEDORA. To fulfil this task, I have talked to the coordinators of the various working groups and as a result produced a paper in which a new structure is proposed for the working groups. This paper has already been distributed to and discussed by the working group coordinators and the EC. In these discussions new ideas have emerged to improve the structure of our working groups and thus the overall effectiveness of FEDORA. If you would like to make suggestions, or comment on suggestions, concerning the future structure of our working groups, you can get into contact with your national coordinator or - if you are a member of a working group - with your working group coordinator. At the next EC meeting in Ireland this April, the EC and the working group coordinators will come together to a joint meeting to further discuss the new structure of the working groups.
